#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - JUNE 2023

We have reached the end of the 2022-23 year for the Birmingham Branch AAUW. I'm not sure that each year ends but rather it experiences a hiatus. Let's look back on what we did this year as a branch.

The year's activities began with Each One Bring One where we welcomed back members and brought in new members. The Study and Interest groups were there to share their plans for the year and, in many cases, welcome new members to their group. In-person meetings have resumed mostly normal activities, which provides opportunities for members to socialize and pursue their common interests.

We had another successful Fall Fundraiser that is so important to our branch and its ability to continue awarding scholarships to three high school students from Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, and Pontiac. We also award scholarships to three college students at Walsh College, Oakland Community College, and Lawrence Technology University. Following conversations with school officials, it was clear to see that these scholarships are helpful for students to get a start in college. But in order for them to continue their education, many of the students need more support. The decision was made to make it possible for students to re-apply for scholarships once they have demonstrated their ability and commitment to succeed in college.

We have also begun a pillowcase project for Big Family of Michigan. Each year we send a group of members to wrap holiday presents for all foster children in the state. The pillowcases have been used to wrap odd – shaped gifts. A suggestion was made to provide a pillowcase for each boy and girl. Our goal is a lofty one – 2000 pillowcases – so keep collecting or making pillowcases and we will start collecting them in the fall. Call me for additional kits for making them or picking them up.

We met each month for lunch with the exception of January and February but zoom meetings were held instead and both featured speakers. One was a handwriting expert and the other was the daughter of one of our own – Barbara Gash – whose daughter, Andrea Durkin, is the Assistant U.S. Trade Representative for World Trade Organization and Multilateral Affairs.

While our in-person monthly luncheons have not returned to pre-pandemic numbers, those that attended were treated to speakers who presented information on many topics from politics, local education challenges and women in baseball. The monthly luncheons also give us the opportunity to resume monthly donations to local organizations that help people in need like Bound Together and Lighthouse.

Lavish Luncheon was held in May. The luncheon was a great success with beautiful centerpieces and gift baskets. Many thanks go out to Karen Boyk, Joanne Brown, Rita Dates, Sandy Dickerson, Cindi Hopkins, Jean Ivory, Nancy O'Connor, Kathy Rice, and Colette Stager who planned this event all year and to Patty Orlowski who kept us all together to get the work done. The proceeds for this event provide funds for scholarships and other work that we do.

What needs improvement? Hopefully, we can continue to increase participation. We could use more "hands on deck" for volunteer opportunities at Bound Together, Moonbeams for Sweet Dreams, Big Family of Michigan, Lighthouse, and others. We have great ideas and intentions, but we need support of our members to make it happen.

As our schools and communities return to a "new normal" existence, we hope to get back into offering support for STEM programs by offering time and resources to some of our neighboring school districts. Robotics Clubs are very popular in many districts, and they are looking for support.

When you see a request for your input, please respond. Great ideas will remain ideas unless we have your involvement.

Each month this year I have tried to acknowledge one or more of our members who have made a notable contribution. As I conclude this letter, I have learned that one of our members who has contributed her talents, wisdom and friendship for many years will be moving to Florida.


