AAUW FUNDS

Nancy Gross Roman, AAUW member and prominent scientist, knew that work must still be done to increase the opportunities for women and girls in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). AAUW has cutting-edge research on this issue. A report, "Why So Few", was paid for by AAUW funds and announced in 2010 press release. Unfortunately, the field has not improved enough to make a significant difference.

Girls and women are systematically tracked away from science and math throughout their education, limiting their access, preparation and opportunities to go into these fields as adults.

Today, women make up only 34% of the workforce in STEM fields. Men vastly outnumber women majoring in most STEM curriculums in college. The gender gaps are particularly high in some of the fastest growing and highest paid jobs of the future like science and engineering.

As we start thinking about our yearly donations, consider your RMD (Required Minimum Distribution). It is a way we can donate to causes we wish to support; at the same time, it reduces the tax liability on the total amount withdrawn. Personally, I give it a lot of thought and include AAUW Funds and local AAUW programs with my list of deserving programs and institutions. I encourage you to seriously consider this also.
