

Great News - Registration is Now Open for Michigan College Women's Leadership Training

NCCWSL (National Conference for Women Student Leaders) is an annual AAUW National conference which brings together hundreds of college women from across the nation for an immersive multi-day experience of leadership training, inspiration, and networking. The conference teaches academic, professional, and personal skills, and exposes the students to national women's issues.

When you donate in the Fall to the AAUW Funds campaign, you help AAUW National sponsor this event. When you donate to our March Branch scholarship fundraiser, as you just did, you help send our local women to this valuable training.

Leadership skills help women students pursue their goals and drive meaningful change in their careers. Our donations and NCCWSL conference skills help empower women to make history!

- Explore alternative formats and styes of meetings and member gatherings. Sally commented that this constitutes a little over half of our membership. She would ask all members to contribute something, regardless of the amount, toward this important goal of our mission.

VOTE ON OPEN MEMBERSHIP FOR AAUW

WHAT: "AAUW National is proposing a bylaws amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership."

WHEN: April 3, 2024, to May 15, 2024

HOW: On-line voting is encouraged but other methods will be announced. More information at our April Annual Meeting on April 10, 2024, at Plum Hollow Country Club.

WHY:


"Our reasons for supporting open membership include the following:

- As AAUW has changed to adapt to the changing world, its membership requirements have changed many times to become more inclusive. This change would allow all who support our mission to stand with us.
- Those without degrees fight for gender equity just as we do. We can be stronger advocates as we learn more about their battles and their alternate paths to success.
- We firmly believe that opening membership is in the best interests of AAUW and its future relevance and sustainability as an inclusive and forward-thinking organization committed to advancing equity for women and girls. Open Membership will finally align our membership requirements with our mission and values.

Voting is a personal privilege in any setting. You are encouraged to read about this proposed bylaw change so that you can make your own decision on how to vote. It is not a surprise that AAUW National is supporting this measure and they have listed why they feel it is important to pass this. What may be a surprise to you is that AAUW Michigan is supporting the passage of this by-law based on what AAUW branch members have told them. The following data is interesting.

"In 2021, 63.75% of AAUW of Michigan branch members approved the change. However, only 30.2% of branch members voted. 69.7% of National Members in Michigan approved the change, but only 5.8% voted. An amendment to the bylaws requires a two-thirds majority of voters to pass."

Based on these numbers a decision could have been made three years ago if more than 6% of Michigan branch members voted. So, I encourage you to investigate **why** this change is being proposed again and **how** it might help to preserve the AAUW and continue its mission to make a difference in the lives of **all** women.

In the evening there will be a reception with hors d'oeuvres and a cash bar, the presentation of Golden Recognition Awards to celebrate our members who have been active in AAUW for fifty years or more, and fun and prizes playing Motown Bingo.

The Annual Meeting and Convention will be held on Saturday, May 11, 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. Lisa Maatz, former Vice President of Government Relations and Advocacy for AAUW (2002-2017), now an independent consultant and nationally sought-after speaker, will be one of our keynote presenters. Sarah Bannon, a consultant and expert in board leadership, will be another featured speaker. Governor Gretchen Whitmer has been invited to attend, but her office is unable to confirm her availability this far in advance.



Bound Together: STEM and more!

While Bound Together has been supported by the generosity of the American Association of University Women for many years (ask me about Shopping Day, and what you mean to us!), it's still often the case that we haven't fully shared with everyone what we do as a program - so here's an opportunity to fix that!

Bound Together serves up to 30 Pontiac students, grades 1-8, with after-school tutoring, enrichment programs and nutrition during the academic year. Our home is at All Saints Episcopal Church in Pontiac, and we are incredibly lucky to be in a facility with full classrooms, common area space, a kitchen and a full-size gym and auditorium! Bound Together is entirely free to participating families, and the only requirement is that families reside within a Pontiac zip code.

The most important element of our program delivery is volunteers; folks who are willing to teach, encourage and get to know our kids. Our volunteers come from all walks of life - retirees, business people, high school and college students! Those who are interested fill out a brief application, undergo a background check and engage in an orientation and/or tour before beginning their chosen role. Volunteers select a day (Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday) to assist, in one of the following primary capacities:

3:45 - 4:30 Pre-program: set up of games/activities in Commons room and gym; set up snack, help supervise students

4:30 - 5:30 Program hour: 1 on 1 tutoring in basic skills, homework help, or in each student's personalized binder

5:00 - 6:00 Dinner hour: prepare a simple dinner, set up tables, serve/clean up, and supervise students

Tuesday - Thursday, we're very fortunate to have the space in which to have individual workstations for tutors/students within a large classroom setting. Our goal is 1:1 tutoring with a consistent tutor/student relationship; we understand our volunteers have many obligations, so please don't worry about needing a sub now and again. All the preparation is done for the tutors as each child has their own binder with work in it, as well as our digital phonics program for children grades 1-5. Often, we are supporting their daily homework in lieu of binder work, so there's always something new!

Last fall, we instituted experiential learning opportunities for our students on Mondays. AAUW has been a huge support of our coding and robotics work, and we are so grateful to members who have come to help our kids:

- First Mondays: Visual art with Pontiac Creative Arts Center
- Second Mondays: Coding/Robotics with Oakland County 4-H
- Third Mondays: William Beaumont School of Medicine
- Fourth Mondays: Physical Fitness/Games with Sheriff PAL

Our facilitators present the program, and volunteers serve as logistics/safety net/extra pairs of hands! As we build this part of the program, we are offering pre-program and program hours without dinner hour.

And in the way of coming events: Bound Together has sponsored a collaborative Vacation Bible School with area Episcopal parishes at All Saints since 2021, providing a chance for a summer camp experience for kids across northern Oakland County. This year's offering is in the planning stages, but we know that it will be an evening program that features dinner at 5, then stories, art, games and science from 5:30 - 7:30.

Our kids LOVED the focus on science last year, and we are definitely looking for volunteers to assist with all aspects of the camp July 15-19!
