Highlights of April Branch Board Meeting

- Annual Budget 2024-25 Nancy O'Connor, Treasurer, presented budget details and line items for review. The Board approved it unanimously. Budget will be emailed to the general membership.
- Branch Meeting Changes the Board heard from Kathy Rice, Kathy Norton and Christine Dagenais regarding changes needed for scheduling luncheons with a reasonable price point and availability. The decision was made to move the monthly luncheons from the second Wednesday to the third Wednesday each month. Following discussion, the Board approved the change for the 2024-25 year.
- At least two monthly meetings (one in fall and one in the spring) will be devoted to branch business and mission-based activities.
- The nominating committee presented the slate of officers to be voted on later at the annual meeting: Cam Takach for VP Membership, Susan Wheatley for Treasurer, and Linda Barclay for Recording Secretary.
- Sally Doty, Foundation President, reported final results from the Annual Scholarship Fundraising Campaign. There was 55% participation from the membership. The amount contributed by members exceeded our goal by more than \$5,000. Total contributions were \$35,170.66.

Dear Scholarship Donor:

I am grateful to be a recipient of the AAUW Birmingham Excellence Award for the Winter 2024 semester at Oakland Community College. Thank you for your generosity!

I'm a true Michigander, and I am quite proud of the state I live in. I was raised in Sterling Heights, Ann Arbor, Warren, and Romeo, but I have resided in Troy for the last six years. It could be due to the geography of the state I'm from, but I have always been passionate about the environment. I feel driven to make a change in the world; the relationship that we have with our environment (in America) is extremely out of balance, and we are starting to feel the effects of that. That alone is a massive privilege that others throughout the world cannot say. I feel it is my responsibility as an able-bodied person with a strong willpower to do my best to make a positive impact on the world around me.

In being awarded this scholarship, I can continue to pursue my education with confidence. The past few years have been burdensome financially, but I have not let that discourage me from school remaining my top priority. This scholarship gives me hope and faith that there are people out there who recognize the value of education and of students, and your generosity touches me deeply. I am beyond grateful for being nominated for this scholarship. Financial support in such trying times is not lost on me. I honestly feel like I could not do this alone -- I could not do this without the support of people like you.

I returned to college two years ago after a five-year hiatus, and what I have been able to achieve this 'go-round' surprises me even still. I returned to OCC as a Global Studies student very passionate about making a positive change in the world, as I mentioned previously. It was actually a career test online that pointed me in the direction of this degree. Returning to college was one of the best decisions I have made in my life. Not only have I excelled in my classes, but I have gained relationships with people all across the college I hope will last a lifetime. Ideally, I wish to make at least one true meaningful contribution to society. Although I came to OCC as a Global Studies student, through exploring my interests, I am set to major in Integrative Studies with concentrations in Anthropology, Environmental Science, and Hispanic Studies at university. I transfer to U of M Dearborn in the Fall. I came in as a humanities student but leaving as a semi-STEM student. Anything is possible; I know this now. It is my wish to change the world in a positive way, and to be a beacon of hope for those who may feel they have "failed" in life -- I thought I did once too, but I am stronger now than I ever was before. My experience informs my life and motivates me to be a better person all the time.

My preferred modality of taking classes is, no doubt, in person. I find the in person classroom experience to be unparalleled. Although I can understand and respect the accessibility online classes provide for students who may not be able to make it to a physical campus, I find that my own learning takes place best while I am in a physical space surrounded by other students and alongside my professor(s).

I feel incredibly blessed by the connections I have made and the relationships I have built at OCC. Some names that come to mind are: Lonn Monroe (Anthropology), Gina Mandas (Spanish), Celeste Bogan (Math), Lori Linden (English), Patrick Harris (Global Studies), Ryan Pacheco (Science), Rosalind Reeves (ASC Faculty), and Edward Stotts (Counseling). As you can see, I have been impacted by quite a few of my professors and colleagues at the college. Ms. Bogan recommended me for a Group Tutoring position in Math Literacy after my first semester back at OCC, and while I am not tutoring this semester due to scheduling issues, I have grown into the role and benefitted so much more from it than I ever could have imagined. The staff and faculty that I have had the utmost pleasure of getting to know at OCC have been instrumental in my growth and change as a person and student. I would not be the same student today if I wasn't blessed with the presence of the aforementioned faculty members. I truly feel like a better person for knowing all of them.

As I intend on acquiring a Master's and/or PhD someday, after receiving this degree, I will be pursuing my education for years into the future. However, obtaining my degree from OCC will be a massive achievement for me -- one I never thought possible -- so I do not mean to downplay the importance of this degree by mentioning my future plans. This degree is like the springboard of which I can jump off into the next step of my education and life. It is a major milestone for me; I will accept it with honor and pride. Although I don't have any specific career plans, it is my dream to work on a project that has to do with solutions around the environment (specifically with waste) and to make a serious and lifechanging breakthrough in that arena.

There have been times where I have seriously contemplated switching back to part-time school and going to full-time work again. VOTE ON OPEN MEMBERSHIP FOR AAUW

This article includes portions of a statement that has been released by the AAUW Michigan. You can find the entire statement on the AAUW Michigan website at aauwmi.org

WHAT: "AAUW National is proposing a bylaws amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership."

WHEN: Voting ends May 15, 2024 at Noon

HOW: On-line voting is encouraged.

WHY:

"Our reasons for supporting open membership include the following:

- As AAUW has changed to adapt to the changing world, its membership requirements have changed many times to become more inclusive. This change would allow all who support our mission to stand with us.
- Those without degrees fight for gender equity just as we do. We can be stronger advocates as we learn more about their battles and their alternate paths to success.
- We firmly believe that opening membership is in the best interests of AAUW and its future relevance and sustainability as an inclusive and forward-thinking organization committed to advancing equity for women and girls. Open Membership will finally align our membership requirements with our mission and values.

Voting is a personal privilege in any setting. You are encouraged to read about this proposed bylaw change so that you can make your own decision on how to vote. It is not a surprise that AAUW National is supporting this measure and they have listed why they feel it is important to pass this. What may be a surprise to you is that AAUW Michigan is supporting the passage of this by-law based on what AAUW branch members have told them. The following data is interesting.

"In 2021, 63.75% of AAUW of Michigan branch members approved the change. However, only 30.2% of branch members voted. 69.7% of National Members in Michigan approved the change, but only 5.8% voted. An amendment to the bylaws requires a two-thirds majority of voters to pass."

Based on these numbers a decision could have been made three years ago if more than 6% of Michigan branch members voted. So, I encourage you to investigate **why** this change is being proposed again and **how** it might help to preserve the AAUW and continue its mission to make a difference in the lives of **all** women.
