#### Branch Board Highlights for the September 2024 Meeting



# There is strength in numbers, and when women unite, we get things done!

Since 1881, AAUW has advocated for women. AAUW has published hundreds of research reports from an 1885 paper disproving a prevailing myth that college impairs a woman's fertility to a recent study documenting the economic impact of workplace sexual harassment. They have supported the academic achievements of many thousands of scholars from scientist Marie Curie, the first woman to win a Nobel Prize, to astronaut Judith Resnik, the second woman to travel in space.

AAUW advocacy efforts have propelled countless new laws, including the Equal Pay Act, first proposed in 1945 and finally passed in 1963; the Title IX amendment in 1972; the Family and Medical Leave Act in 1993; the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act in 2009; and the Paycheck Fairness Act, which was passed by the U.S. Representatives in 2019 but is awaiting action in the Senate.

We've come a long way, but we still have a long way to go. When you contribute to AAUW Funds, you join with women across the world to improve the lives of women and girls. The AAUW Birmingham Branch has always been a big supporter of AAUW initiatives, and we plan to continue this tradition. AAUW Birmingham has designated March as the month that we focus on supporting AAUW Funds.

When you donate to AAUW Funds, you can designate where your funds go:

- 9110-AAUW Greatest Needs Fund allows AAUW to respond rapidly to critical issues affecting women as they emerge. It also funds research.
- 4450-Education & Training Fund addresses the barriers that prevent women from thriving in school and pursuing the careers of their dreams.
- 4452-Leadrship Fund Supports AAUW's work to bolster the number of women in top roles across all industries by addressing systematic biases and giving women the skills and resources they need to lead.
- 4451-Governance & Sustainability Fund enables AAUW to function as efficiently as possible by incorporating state-of-the art technology into the member database and other systems.
- 2504-National Conference for College Women Students Leaders Scholarships provides financial aid for attendance at this leadership conference.
