Global Connections - AAUW at the United Nations

AAUW works to advance equality for women and girls across the globe. Barriers still keep education, economic security, and leadership out of reach for millions. Support and access to resources, education, health care, and job opportunities are essential to give women pathways to strive. AAUW has awarded fellowships and grants to 13,000 women in more than 150 countries. Our work also supports and is aligned with the UN, UN Women, the U.S. Department of State, and multiple global coalitions to improve the status of women and girls throughout the world.

Through AAUW's special consultative status with the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs, we attend briefings, organize events, and participate in coalitions to take action on issues that impact girls and women, including access to education and training, leadership, women's economic security, opportunities in STEM, ending human trafficking, and working with the NGO Committee on the Status of Women and the UN Commission on the Status of Women.

National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) Update

AAUW hosted the National Conference for Student Leadership (NCCWSL) for over 39 years. During this time, the Birmingham

Branch Foundation has sponsored the attendance of many promising female student leaders at this event.

You should have received a message from National stating that they have decided that the most efficient and productive way to use their resources is to hand over the hosting of NCCWSL to NASPA – Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education. NASPA will be responsible for the planning and execution of the conference moving forward. AAUW will have a presence at the conference, as a speaker, exhibitor, presenter, and promotional supporter. Branches will still be able to register young women for the conference and to support them.

Donations made directly to AAUW designating NCCWSL support will be used in the following way: 80% will go to support student associate members' attendance at the conference; the remaining 20% will go to support staff. You may continue to donate to National and designate your donation as intended to support the continued presence of AAUW at NCCWSL. The details are not currently available, but the AAUW Birmingham Branch Foundation plans to continue to sponsor the attendance of local female leaders at this event. We are delighted that this opportunity will continue to be offered to our future leaders!
