#### April Community Outreach Hope Against Trafficking

Hope Against Trafficking is a non-profit organization answering the call for safe housing and restorative support for adult women survivors of sex and laboring trafficking in SE Michigan.

They offer Magdalene Detroit, a 24 month residential program, which provides rent free housing and comprehensive services focused on physical, mental, and economic transformation. Survivors are referred by law enforcement and prominent local social service organizations. Many of the women have been caught in a cycle of addiction or sexual or economic exploitation, which has been induced through threat, force or coercion.

Donation items include cleaning supplies such as laundry detergents, Windex, dusting products like Pledge, dish washing detergent, cleansers for sink, bathtub and toilets and brooms, mops, brushes and buckets. They can also use personal hygiene products like deodorants, body wash, shampoo, conditioner, tampons, and sanitary napkins.

They receive support to heal and achieve skills for success. In addition to staff, organizations like this need assistance and support from the communities around them.

Another group that I recently learned more about is the Pontiac Promise Zone. Coco Moulder, Executive Director for the Promise Zone, held a workshop for members of our branch who volunteered to be coaches for the young women. About ten branch members represented us to learn about what it means to be a coach.

Reflecting on what both groups do for young women, it occurred to me that we have many resources to share with them. We have members who are anxious to volunteer their time and others who freely donate everyday items that are always in short supply.

Given the many changes that have taken place over the last five years, we as a branch have opportunities to be a part of these programs in our own way. Through the AAUW National, there are tools that could be used to contribute to the development of skills necessary for achieving success. I hope that you will do your part so that the Birmingham AAUW Branch can continue the work that was started so many years ago.

Two of our members performed with **The Windover Chamber Singers** on Sunday, March 23rd at the **Orchard Lake Community Church**. The performance, *Nevertheless, She Persisted*, featured American women composers. Branch members Lara Alami (soprano) and Susan Wheatley (pianist) joined four other performers telling the story about accomplishments of women through music, poetry, and storytelling. A free will offering collected at the church was donated to our scholarship fund. Reverend Richard Lapehn, Orchard Lake Community Church Pastor, welcomed attendees and shared a story of his mother's involvement with AAUW. ## Women First International Fund

Women First International Fund has committed to providing multi-year funding and organizational resilience to support groups like Mujeres Libres (Free Women), a womenled grassroots group in El Salvador. Founded by a woman who endured over a decade of wrongful imprisonment under one of the world's harshest legal systems, Mujeres Libres empowers formerly incarcerated women from marginalized communities to rebuild their lives and reclaim their power. In El Salvador, life after prison often means facing barriers to employment, societal stigma and the lasting emotional scars of incarceration and isolation. Mujeres Libres creates pathways to financial independence through skills training, psychological support and seed funding for small businesses. These activities help the women break barriers and challenge the status quo, creating immediate and lasting impact.

When AAUW Birmingham Branch members pay their annual dues, it breaks down this way: \$72 supports AAUW National; \$15 supports AAUW of Michigan, and \$17 supports our Branch operations. However, dues don't provide enough funding to support all the work of AAUW National.

Because we value the important work that AAUW does to empower women and girls, our branch designated March - Women's History Month - as a time to contribute to AAUW National Funds. Although you may donate at any time, this is the only time you will receive emails and donation requests from our branch for this purpose.

Several years ago, the branch established the AAUW Birmingham Branch Foundation, a 501-c3 nonprofit. Your donations to the Foundation are tax-free and fund local scholarships and activities to support women/ girls. That is our mission!

Of course, AAUW Birmingham Branch Foundation is thrilled to receive donations for any amount and at any time. In the fall we will have a special fundraiser or mailing when members are asked to give to our local scholarships. The Foundation needs to raise

nearly thirty thousand dollars to fund the scholarships that we give each year. This is an

ambitious goal.

We know you are inundated with donation requests, so the Foundation Board created a plan to limit our fundraising to March for National and September and October for our mission-based activities.

#### Great News – Registration is Now Open for Michigan College Women's Leadership Training

The AAUW Birmingham Branch Foundation allocates funds that enables our Branch to send two or three local Michigan college/university women to an exceptional conference scheduled for the end of May 2025.

NCCWSL (National Conference for Women Student Leaders) is an annual national conference which brings together hundreds of college women from across the nation for an immersive multi-day experience of leadership training, inspiration, and networking. The conference teaches academic, professional, and personal skills, and exposes the students to national women's issues.

Leadership skills help women students pursue their goals and drive meaningful change in their careers. Our donations and NCCWSL conference skills help empower women to make history!

AAUW has passed the "running of the event" to a new organization, NASPA, but the conference continues as it has in the past. ## **Coaching with the Pontiac Promise Zone**

Advocacy for women, and particularly for the empowering impact of education on women's self-determination success, has always been central to the mission and vision of the American Association of University Women. Energized by a new outreach platform that seeks to put that mission to work, AAUW-Birmingham members gathered on Monday, March 3 at All Saints Episcopal in Pontiac for a "lunch and learn" orientation launch to our Promise Zone Coaching Project. Coco Moulder, Executive Director of the Pontiac Promise Zone (and a new member of AAUW!) gave a powerful overview of the challenges faced by first-generation college women who are served by the Promise Zone.

This project seeks to partner AAUW members with young women who are currently studying at Oakland Community College or Oakland University, providing them with encouragement, advice, problem-solving, and maybe some chocolate during final exams! The Pontiac Promise Zone provides financial support for students coming out of Pontiac schools as they pursue their dreams via education - but getting students into their post-secondary program is just the beginning. We know that these students, and perhaps especially our girls, often do not have a place to turn within their familial and social

networks for support or advice about the college experience. That's where AAUW comes in:

with the initial goal of providing those reminders about getting to class, staying on top of the homework, going to office hours - the practical input, and a little bit of cheerleading, as students lean into an environment that is unfamiliar, challenging, and sometimes scary.

We are at the very beginning of this work, and so if you are intrigued: this is the perfect moment! We will be putting together a meeting within the next month to further identify activities and expectations for our members, as well as to think about a calendar that might include group events on campus to allow for community-building among the students and our members alike. We hope to roll out initial contacts with students in May/June (because the summer is still an important time to sustain forward motion) and to hit the ground with impact this fall.

As so many of us look for ways to be the change that we would like to see in the world, we're hoping that this project will fill that aspiration in ways that are life-changing -- on both sides of the equation.
